

NEWS FROM THE MIDDLE AND HIGH SCHOOLS AUGUST/SEPTEMBER 2004

PRINCIPAL'S INFORMATION

Welcome to the 2004-05 school year. We already have some new students registered at both middle and high school. If you know of other students who are planning to register but have not yet come in, please encourage them to come to the office to set up a schedule before school begins.

As you may have heard, Pete Vraspir has taken a leave of absence from his teaching position to go to Alaska for a year. He will be a computer specialist for a small school district near Denali National Park. Pete taught 8th grade Introductory Physical Science, Integrated Math 1 at the high school and middle school computer applications. We have not yet determined who will be replacing Pete, but will make the final decisions as soon as possible and hopefully will be able to send out an announcement before the start of school.

Please plan to attend the **Back to School Nights** on Tuesday, September 21st for middle school and Wednesday, September 22nd, for high school. Come and meet our teachers, and bring your questions, concerns and suggestions. The middle school program begins at 7PM and the high school program at 6:30PM.

In addition to these Back to School Nights, please don't hesitate to make an appointment or request a phone call so that you can discuss your student with his/her teacher(s) at the beginning of the year or at any time. You may want to give the teacher a few weeks to get to know your student before you call or you may want to talk to the teacher before or at the very start of this year's classes. Either one is fine.

If you have other questions or concerns, please call the school office at 376-2287. The office officially opens this year on August 12th after Georgia and I complete training on the new computer system. The state computer system that we use for attendance, grading, transcripts, schedules, etc. is undergoing major and much needed changes. The updated programs will make access to information on our system much better for staff, students and parents.

Data transfer from the old to the new computer system is planned for Thursday, August 12th and Friday, August 13th. Depending on how well the transfer of data goes, we will either be entering student schedule changes directly into the new system or using the old fashioned but still workable, paper system. With the new system, you will see some changes in information and formats on student schedule cards and report cards. With the transfer of data, mistakes are very possible. Please let us know if you see errors on any mailing addresses or student information cards or anything that you receive from us after August 13th.

WASL TEST SCORES

We have just received the WASL test scores and individual scores will be sent home as soon as we can do so. There appear to be some errors in the group reports which will need to be corrected at the state level and then scores will be reported in the parent handbook. Most 10th graders passed the reading, writing and math tests. A few students did not pass a test and will want to retake that one in April so that their transcript indicates that they passed all three tests.

The 7th graders also did very well on the tests. Their test scores help us to see what we need to do and what the student needs to do to ensure that he/she can easily pass the 10th grade test which is a graduation requirement for

them. At the 7th grade level, we are not asking that all students pass the tests. We are asking that all students demonstrate their level of skill so that we know and they know what needs to be done to pass in 10th.

Congratulations to all of the students on their achievement and congratulations to the parents and teachers who helped them. A special thanks to all of the parents who provided food for both the 7th and the 10th graders during the testing period. Those snacks not only gave the students a lift physically, but also made them feel special and no doubt contributed to their success.

The high scores in 7th and in 10th indicate that students who do their work in class and who take the time to do careful work on the WASL test are likely to pass on the first attempt. Beginning with this year's 11th graders, students who did not pass the WASL on the first attempt can retake the test that they failed. The students who are entering 9th grade this year are the first class whose students will be required to pass the WASL in order to graduate from high school. As with last year's 10th graders, we expect that most of them will pass all of the tests on the first try.

NEW MATH CLASS OFFERING

This year, we are offering an opportunity for students to take Integrated Math I over two years instead of one. Last year was the first time that the high school received Title 1 money from the Federal government. This money allows us to offer classes that provide some extra support to help students succeed in school. Last year, we used the money to offer study skills classes.

This year we will continue to offer study skills classes but will also offer another option for completing Integrated Math 1. Students will have the option of taking a one year Integrated Math 1 class which is a good choice for most students or the two year course which covers the same material but adds more practice problems and more review of earlier concepts if needed.

The new classes will be called Integrated Math 1A for the first year and Integrated Math 1B for the second year. These are the class names that will appear on the student's transcript. This class is intended for students who have had trouble with math in past years or who would simply like a more thorough grounding in mathematics as they enter high school. The class will be taught by Kari Schuh and will replace the Math Essentials class that we have offered in previous years.

If your student was registered to take Math Essentials, he/she has been assigned to Integrated Math 1A. If your student is currently registered to take Integrated Math 1 and you think that he/she would do better in a two year Integrated Math class, or if you have questions about your student's math placement, please call the office and talk with Barbara Kline or Nancy Wrightsman.

INDEPENDENT STUDY LANGUAGES

This year, there are two independent study language classes offered at the high school, French and Latin. Latin has been offered for several years and French is a new class that is being offered for the first time this year. Both classes are approved as independent study classes which means that there is a tuition fee for each class but that students who complete the class requirements will receive Orcas Island High School credit.

French One and Latin One are both open to all students in high school. 8th graders may also take Latin One and French One but students and parents need to be aware that taking these classes will affect the student's regular 8th grade program. For more information or, if you have questions, please call the school office at 376-2287.

French One will be offered at the high school at the 3rd period on A days. Full language credit is available. Contact the high school to register. The class will include learning vocabulary, practicing dialogue, role-playing, and learning about cultures where French is spoken. The class is taught at the high school and is made possible through a collaboration between Orcas High School and the Orcas Island Recreation Program. You may call the Recreation Program office at 376-5339 if you have any questions or would like additional information.

Latin I, Latin II, and Latin III will be offered at the high school this year. Francie Kisko will continue to be the instructor as she has in past years. If you have not yet registered for these classes and want to do so, please call the school office or Francie Kisko.

SAT AND ACT TEST REGISTRATION

Remember you must register by September 7th to take the October 9th SAT. Registration materials are in the office or you can register online at collegeboard.com. The new SAT tests start in March 2005. Students may want to take both the old and the new version of the test and compare their scores. College will look at the best scores on whatever tests the student takes.

You must register by September 17th to take the October 23rd ACT. Registration materials are in the office or you may register online.

Check to see whether or not your selected colleges require you to take SAT II subject area tests as well as the SAT I. If the college requires the SAT II tests, check to see if there are specific tests to take or if the school will accept any three SAT II subject area tests. Both SAT I and SAT II are offered on October 9th.

For more information and assistance with testing and any post high school plans, please talk with our counselor Nancy Wrightsman.

SPORTS PROGRAMS

High School **Volleyball and Soccer** begin practice the week of August 23rd High School **Football** begins a week earlier. The football coach is Dennis Dahl, the volleyball coach is Gregg Sasan and the soccer coach is Terry Turner. Any high school student who cannot come for the first week of practices is still welcome to come and join a team.

Please remember that students cannot practice until all of the paperwork (which includes a physical) is complete and fees are paid. Messages for the coaches or for Dennis Dahl, our athletic director, can be left at the school office(376-2287).

The **athletic department needs volunteers to work at the football and volleyball games** taking tickets. We could use 3 people each game and would ask them to be at the game about an hour before the starting time. Please call athletic director, Dennis Dahl(376-2287), if you would like to volunteer yourself or someone else to help with this important activity.

Middle School sports will not begin until after the start of school. Middle school students are also required to have a physical and other paperwork completed before they begin practice. If your student is interested in starting the school year by playing either soccer or volleyball, you should arrange for a sports physical before school begins.

Susan Aspinall is the coach of the **Crew** team which is not an official school sport but has a number of student participants from both middle and high school. Crew practice is before school and meets are usually on weekends.

Burke Thomas coaches the **Sailing** team which is not an official school sport but has a number of participants from both middle and high school. For more information please see the Sailing Team flyer included with this newsletter.

GIRLS' AND BOYS' STATE

Thanks to the generosity of the members of the American Legion Auxiliary, two of our girls, Hannah Halliday and Tyler Jo Holmes were able to attend Girls' State in Ellensburg in June. Unfortunately, no boys from last year's junior class were able to attend Boys' State.

The two girls spent a week living in the dorms at Central Washington University which was an experience in itself. They were divided into "cities" and "counties", organized, ran and voted in elections for officials including state and local positions, heard from a number of speakers on governmental issues, participated in a mock trial, and generally worked hard all week to learn about state government. They were tired students at the end of the week.

Girls and Boys' State will happen again next June and spaces will be offered again next spring to interested Juniors in our school. If you or your student have some interest in this program please talk with Nancy Wrightsman, our school counselor for more information.

BACK TO SCHOOL NIGHT FOR HIGH SCHOOL

Our High School Back to School Night is scheduled for **Wednesday, September 22nd** at **6:30PM**. You will have the opportunity to visit each of your student's classrooms, which means attending six different classes in one evening. Therefore, we begin at 6:30PM in the cafeteria for a very short introduction and orientation; then you will follow your student's schedule of classes.

SCHOOL PHOTOS

Picture Day for the middle and high school is **Wednesday, September 15th**. Information will be sent home with students early in September. If a student misses that day or needs another photo for some other reason, a retake day will be scheduled in October.

MIDDLE SCHOOL EXPLORATORY

On the first or second day of school, middle school students will be given information and a class selection form for exploratory classes for this year. Final decisions have not been made but we know that we will be offering a variety of classes such as Computer Applications, Sailing, Foods, Sewing, and Art.

FIRST DAY OF SCHOOL FOR MIDDLE SCHOOL

Middle School students will be divided into groups for their first class of the day during the first quarter. Half of the 7th graders will have Life Skills with Mrs. Wrightsman, our school counselor. The other half of the 7th and all of the 8th graders will have PE with one of our PE teachers, Dennis Dahl or Cindy Elliott.

For the first day of school all* middle school students should report to the old gym. Whether students have been assigned PE or Life Skills for the first class of the day, all students meet in the old gym on Tuesday, August 31st at 8:30am.

After this first class which will be over at 9:30am, the students will report to their AM section classes. For 7th graders this will be either Math/Science or Language Arts/Social Studies. The 7th grade teachers are Lyn Perry for Language Arts/Social Studies and Lori Oakes for Math/Science. For 8th graders their first class after PE on Tuesday will be math. A few 8th grade students will go to the high school for Integrated Math 1. The majority of 8th graders will go to middle school classrooms for math. The 8th grade teachers are Kathi Anderson for Language Arts/Social Studies and the teacher who will replace Pete Vraspir for Math/Science.

Joyce Pearson will be working with both 7th and 8th grade students for enrichment math at 1st and 4th quarters. Thanks to Orcas Island Community Foundation for the grant that provides us with this program!

So that students know whether they are in the AM or PE time block, middle school class lists will be posted on the classroom doors and windows of the middle school and of the old gym. There will be staff available in the courtyard and around the classrooms and gym to welcome students and help them to find the right rooms.

Remember: at 8:30am all* middle school students come to the old gym on the first day of class.

All students should come to school with their school materials including a binder, pens, pencils and paper. Students may not need all materials on the first day of school but they are sure to need the basics which are a binder with paper, pens, and pencils. Assignment books are very useful to have on the first day of school as well. These may be purchased (\$4) before school begins or during the first week of school.

***Please note that the 8th graders who have Advanced Writing for High School with Kathi Anderson at the high school should go to that class at 8:30am on the first day of school.**

STUDENT MATERIALS MIDDLE SCHOOL

The following is a list of basic equipment needed for students. Other items may be required for specific projects or classes:

1. Colored Pencils (Box of 36 or bigger)
2. Pens (Blue or black ink only)
3. Pencils
4. 1 1/2 – 2 inch ring binder with dividers
5. Ruler (Metric)
6. Calculator (Ex: Texas Instruments: Math Explorer)
7. Scissors
8. College-ruled paper
9. 3 spiral notebooks
10. Container to hold supplies
11. Gum eraser

Middle School students will also be required to purchase and use a school homework/calendar book which is available from the school office for \$4.

ASSIGNMENT/CALENDAR BOOKS FOR HIGH SCHOOL AND MIDDLE SCHOOL

All middle school and 9th and 10th grade students in the high school will be expected to purchase and use a school assignment/calendar book. The books are the same for middle school and high school and are available from the school office for \$4. The books may be purchased before school begins or during the first week of classes. 11th and 12th grade students are welcome to purchase a school calendar as long as supplies are available.

PE LOCKS FOR MIDDLE AND HIGH SCHOOL

All students who have PE will be assigned a locker or a locking basket to hold their personal items while at PE. Lockers/baskets should be locked so a lock is an important item to own. Students may use the locks that they have already purchased while in high school or in middle school.

If you have forgotten the combination to your school lock, you can still use the lock. Just bring the lock in to school and the PE teachers can find the combination for you. If you think that other students know your lock combination, you should consider purchasing a new lock. New locks are available at the school office for \$6.

Students will also need locks for the corridor lockers at the high school that will be assigned by the ASB officers after school begins. Students will be expected to lock these lockers with a school lock that can be opened by school personnel if necessary.

SENIORS' PHOTOS NEEDED FOR YEARBOOK

All seniors need to bring in their senior photo for this year's yearbook as soon as possible in September. This photo must be in color and should be a professional quality photo. You may bring in the photo in paper or digital format, just be sure that it is in the hands of the yearbook staff well before the end of September.

FIRST DAY OF SCHOOL FOR HIGH SCHOOL

High School students will go to their **A day classes on Tuesday, August 31st**, the first day. All three classes will meet following the following time schedule:

1ST PERIOD	8:30	-	9:35

Students should come prepared to have classes on the first day. That means bring binders, paper, pens, and pencils for class and PE clothes, if the student has PE on the first day.

On Wednesday, September 1st, all students will attend their B day classes on a regular school schedule. The times for classes will be:

On **Monday, September 13th**, high school students will attend all 6 of their classes.. A days will be on Tuesdays and Thursdays. B days will be on Wednesdays and Fridays. Monday will be a 6 period

day. Because of the Labor Day Holiday, Monday the 13th of September will be our first 6th period day of this school year.

Computer printouts of class schedules, including teacher names and room numbers will be available before school begins and on the first days of school for any student who needs/wants another copy of their schedule. Staff members will be available in the high school commons and classrooms to welcome students and to help them find their way to their classes.

9th graders and new students, or any students who would like to do so, are welcome to come to the high school before the first day of classes to find their way to their classrooms. Please note that a few room assignments may change and be prepared to read a sign or ask if the class does not appear to be meeting in the room you expect.

Students who have PE should be sure to purchase a school lock or to bring the one that they purchased and used in middle school or high school last year. If you need to purchase a new lock, these are available in the school office for \$6. It is important to have a school lock and to use it to lock up all personal items securely while students are at PE.

There are thieves among us. Do not become a victim. Use a lock.

9th and 10th graders will need assignment books which may be purchased for \$4 before school begins or during the first week of school.

HIGH SCHOOL SCHEDULE CHANGES

High School students have been talking about needing to make changes or corrections to their schedules. If you know that you want or need to make changes in your schedule, it is a good idea to do this before school begins on August 31st.

If you would like to make changes, remember to complete the Request for a Change of Schedule form that was included with your schedule. We must have a parent signature to make the change for you and there must be space in the new classes you wish to add. Students and/or parents are welcome to come in and talk about schedules or transcripts with Mrs. Kline or Mrs. Wrightsman. In order to be sure that someone is available to speak with you, you may want to call for an appointment (376-2287).

STUDENT MATERIALS HIGH SCHOOL

The following is a list of basic equipment needed for students. Other items may be required for specific projects or classes:

1. A sturdy 3-ring binder and dividers or some other organizer so that papers can be found.
2. A pen/pencil pouch for the notebook.
3. Pens and pencils. (pens should be either blue or black ink)
4. Erasers.
5. One or more spiral notebooks. Buy the kind with perforated pages for easy/neat removal
6. Notebook paper (college ruled is preferred for some classes).

7. A calculator that you know how to use. The type of calculator may depend on the math class you are taking.

All 9th and 10th grade students will also be required to purchase and use a school homework/calendar book which is available from the school office for \$4.

DRESS CODE FOR MIDDLE AND HIGH SCHOOL

Please be aware that there is a dress code at the middle and high schools. While we try to allow students freedom of expression, inappropriate clothing can be very distracting and therefore we ask that students comply with the following expectations:

-Students are not to wear any clothes that expose their midriff. In other words, tops and bottoms should meet without skin showing for both males and females.

*Please check to see what happens when you sit down.
What is the person behind you seeing?*

-No one should be able to see a student's undergarments; this means that pants and tops should cover straps and waistbands and all other parts of underwear. Pants should not be so loose that they fall down as a student moves around.

Again, check to see what happens when you sit down.

-Shorts should be long enough to (at least) meet the fingertips of the student's arms hanging at his/her sides. Skirts should be that long or longer.

-Tops should be modest both in how low they are cut and in how tight they fit. This is true for boys as well as for girls.

There may be other clothing that will result in a student being asked to change or cover up.

The specific guidelines above are intended to help clarify the following section of our student handbooks which outlines the general expectations for student dress and grooming:

"While on campus or at any school-sponsored event, students are to be dressed and groomed in a manner which reflects good taste and decency and which does not detract from or interfere with the instructional program, the general morale or the image of the school. Dress and appearance must not present health or safety problems or cause disruption. Students are expected to come to school well groomed and neatly and appropriately dressed. All students must wear shoes. Students who do not meet these standards may be asked to return home to correct the problem. If a student chooses to regularly wear inappropriate clothing to school, he/she will be subject to disciplinary actions including detention and suspension from school.

Clothing which carries a sexual, vulgar or offensive message or references the use of alcohol, tobacco, drugs, or gang affiliation will not be permitted. Read your T-shirts and hats and please do not wear clothes that offend or advertise illegal substances including alcohol, drugs or tobacco. It is understood that individual teachers in consultation with the school administrator may restrict appearance and attire with special consideration for safety, cleanliness, or class requirements. If you choose to wear unacceptable clothing, we may request that you change your clothes.

It is understood that individual teachers in consultation with the school administrator may restrict appearance and attire with special consideration for safety, cleanliness, or class requirements.

Decisions regarding the appropriateness of clothing will be made by the principal/staff member. In the event that there is some question regarding clothes or appearance, parents/guardians may be contacted." High School and Middle School Handbooks

READINESS TO LEARN PROGRAM

Readiness to Learn (RTL) is a grant-funded program through the Washington State Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction. There are 26 programs throughout the state. Each one is a unique partnership between parents, schools, and community all working together to provide meaningful support which will help children and youth succeed in school. Participation in the RTL program is completely voluntary and confidential. All families who participate in the program work closely with their Family Advocate. The relationship between the family and the Advocate is a partnership designed to help families meet their needs and reach their goals.

In working together, families identify their strengths, establish reachable goals, problem-solve when they encounter obstacles, and develop solid family support networks as well as a working knowledge of community resources. Family Support can take many forms. Some of the resources that families have accessed include rental assistance, counseling referrals, health insurance information, access to public assistance, parenting classes and support, or legal referrals.

The middle and high schools have two part time RTL Family Advocates. They are Oliver and Eden Bailey. Their office is located in the school library and they can be reached by phone at 376-5226 or email at obailey@orcas.k12.wa.us or ebailey@orcas.k12.wa.us.
